## *The Light of Christ*

*“The light of Christ.”*

*“Thanks be to God.”*

For some of you, these phrases will elicit the sounds of chanting. Our liturgies are peppered with such exchanges between deacon and congregation. The Easter Vigil will likely spring first to mind for those who know and love that ancient and moving liturgy. The exchange is a powerful reminder that even in death, new life emerges—as a light erases darkness.

The service of Evening Prayer begins with a similar exchange:

*“Jesus Christ is the light of the world.”*

*“The light no darkness can overcome.”*

*“Stay with us, Lord, for it is evening.”*

*“And the day is almost over.”*

*“Let your light scatter the darkness.”*

*“And illumine your church.”*

Light is a prominent metaphor during so much of our liturgical year. Some would say too prominent. Surely there are other powerful images that could be used. And yet there is so much power in the way light plays upon our lives and in our world.

In these middle latitudes, we live at the mercy of the way the light of the sun shapes the places that tilt at various angles during the year. Light and shadow figure prominently in the quality of a photograph. We sense the shadows of darkness in our world in the form of war and disease and hurt, even as know the glowing warmth of bathing in the light—whether of the sun on a beach or the blessings of peace and healing.

During Epiphany, our liturgies follow the sun and the Son, as light swells and darkness is slowly dispelled. We celebrate this growing light by emphasizing our various missions in the world—ways in which we hope to be the hands and feet of God (and mirrors of God’s light) to work alongside God and God’s vision for all creation.

Despite the possibility that many of us may be somewhat inured to this recurring metaphor, the reality—both physical and spiritual—of illumination persists. May these days of growing light bring strength to our hearts and minds, bodies and souls, mission and ministry.

## *Bringing Faith Home*



Wondering how you could bring church home and make church more of a home for your family? We would love to invite interested families to a fun and engaging six-session course called Faith 5, *Holding Your Family Together*. Over the course of the program, you will learn 5 simple steps to connect church to home every night. Families will be equipped with the tools and know-how to implement the five steps into the core of your nightly family bedtime routine.

The course breaks the five steps down into the following six session format:

1. Intro: an overview of the five steps and course process
2. Share: your highs and lows
3. Read: a Bible verse or story
4. Talk: about how the Bible reading relates to your highs and lows
5. Pray: for one another's highs and lows
6. Bless: one another

Our first session in the course will be on Sunday, January 19<sup>th</sup> and will run from 12:30-2pm. A simple lunch and child care will be provided during the event. Later dates to continue the course will be decided at this first meeting.

## *St. Thomas Sunday School Fundraiser 2013-2014: el Sembrador pre-school in Chile*

This year the St. Thomas Sunday School kids are raising money for el Sembrador pre-school outside of Santiago, Chile. El Sembrador pre-school (and, after school, a community center) serves a community of mostly uneducated laborers – such as housekeepers, street vendors, and trash collectors – whose wages provide subsistence income, but not enough to cover childcare. According to a 2006 visit and report by former ELCA missionaries Kate Lawler and David Wunsch, the community, a shantytown called Campamento Peñalolén, “started as a land take-over in 1999 by hundreds of homeless families. Nineteen hundred families (approximately 15,000 people) now live on these 22 hectares of land which were once a garbage dump.” Soledad Puebla, the director of el Sembrador (“the Sower”), says that because of the great need in this community, the waiting list to get into the school is long.



The timing of this opportunity to help and learn about this school is especially poignant: this fall marked the 40-year anniversary of the 1973 coup that overthrew Chile’s elected socialist government and destroyed “what had been one of South America’s healthiest democracies.” What followed the coup was seventeen years of military dictatorship under General August Pinochet, who “suspended political and civil rights; censored the press; and imprisoned, tortured, exiled, abducted or killed tens of thousands of its opponents” (The New York Times, Sept. 8, 2013). Now, forty years later, Chileans continue to struggle against the legacy of this dictatorship both in finding justice for victims of the regime and in trying to restore democracy. At el Sembrador, Puebla addresses this need by teaching the children the basic tenets of a democratic society: that they have the right to learn, the right to live free of violence in their homes, and the right to a healthy diet, for example. The United Nations’ “International Rights of the Child” is a strong framework for the school.

The funds raised will go to school supplies like crayons and paper and craft materials for the children. Puebla hopes the fundraiser will not just be about raising money but will also be a chance to learn about each other’s cultures and languages and, most importantly, to walk in solidarity with each other.

Our ELCA-sponsored missionary, Karen Anderson, who visited St. Thomas this summer to talk about her work promoting women’s health in this same community in Chile, connected us with el Sembrador. In January we plan to teach the St. Thomas children a few Spanish-language lessons and songs.

January 26: Nickolas Montgomery, Conference Room: Artificial Intelligence and the Church or How to Baptize a Robot without Short-circuiting. The possibility of Artificial Intelligence (AI) has been debated since the beginning of the 20th Century. While optimism about the possibility of a conscious machine has grown over the course of the century, science fiction writers like Isaac Asimov, and films such as 2001: A Space Odyssey and The Matrix have warned us of the ethical conundrums that face us should we create such a machine. No longer merely science fiction, it seems highly likely that many of us will see machines with computational powers that rival human minds in our life time. How should Christians respond to the coming of the machines? We will take a look at some of the famous arguments for and against the possibility of AI, see how good we are at spotting the difference between machines and humans by administering our own Turing Test (or something close enough), and discuss how Christians should respond to the making of conscious machines.

## *Reflections on the Mission Committee and St. Thomas*

Nearly seven years ago we were tasked with starting up the first mission committee at St. Thomas. Since its inception we have had the following people involved on the committee (a wonderful intergenerational group): Helen Ingersoll, Lyman Hitchcock, Cindy Vosahlik Julcarima, Suzy VanNasdale, Karl Eagleman, Rita and Dave Pavolka, Kaye Hill, Dorothy Soudakoff, Chris Ogan, Carol Seaman, Dawn and Darrell Bakken, Suzanne Halvorson, Ruth Rives, Charlene Braun and Sarah Fogleman. Pastor Lyle has been with us along this journey too.

In the beginning, we spent some time pondering what "mission" meant in terms of geography (local, national, global) and what our priorities should be (e.g. relationships, funding or actions or put another way, love, mercy or justice)...This has turned into a marvelous expansive "bubbling up" experience where we have followed the mission passions of our committee and supported those of other small groups and individuals in our faith community.

Being involved in the Mission Committee at St. Thomas has changed me in countless ways. I would briefly like to share just a few here with you.

1) Lens for my spiritual life: I have gained a new depth for what it means to be a Christian in today's world, calling me to action locally, nationally and globally. I am also now linked in my devotions and prayers to Christians throughout the world in a more personal way. The devotions shared in our group have enriched and deepened my faith.

2) Challenged me to consider difficult topics and my own views: engaging in mission is difficult, connecting us with people often in very difficult circumstances. Sometimes it can get me down, but mostly I am thankful to have a way to join others in trying to have an impact. Some examples are, learning about human trafficking and fair trade, learning about the struggles our friends in other countries have to get an education, etc.

3) Provided a caring family within St. Thomas, deepening relationships: at our committee's planning session we discussed how the mission committee is like a family for us, extending support, prayer, encouragement and joy. These relationships impact how I feel when I come to church on Sundays, but they also carry throughout the week in numerous ways.

4) Gave me a new appreciation for being Lutheran: as one of my daughters said, "Wow, if more people knew all the amazing things that the ELCA is up to around the world, then I bet more people would come to church and become Lutheran!" The social justice dimension of our mission work has been a light for both me and our teenage daughters. Through our church and the various mission related activities and organizations such as CROP Walk, Heifer International and the Fair Trade items we feature in our craft sales, our daughters learned about social justice and mercy through our church. It has been a source of excitement, pride and meaning to see our church's faith in action throughout the world.

5) My life has been transformed through learning about the challenges others face around the world and yet the amount of grace and hospitality that they offer, including the Women of Hope in Nigeria and our friends in Chichipate and Living Waters. Similarly, I am always spurred on by our wonderful community here at St. Thomas and all of the energy and generosity of time and talents in our local community and beyond.

Thank you for this opportunity to expand my understanding and experience of God's presence in the world through the mission and ministry of the church.


