At communion, everyone is welcome. This includes doubters, young children, and folks who have yearned for this feast. Come forward at the direction of an usher and receive handtorn bread or gluten-free wafers and pink wine or red grape juice. If you have mobility limitations, please take the closest available place at the altar, or ask an usher for Communion to be brought to you at your seat.

We hope you know our welcome extends beyond our building.

Today's 8:30 a.m. service is livestreamed. By attending this service, you are giving permission to be in the video we produce. Gifts placed in the offering plate by the worship doors contribute to this mission.

P: We especially honor God for the work of Lutheran Campus Ministry, which had its beginning in our midst.


C: We are thankful that this congregation has also been led to reach out to all sorts and conditions of God's children—seekers and faithful disciples from every walk of life.



We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life—this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us—what we have seen and heard we also declare to you so that you also may have fellowship with us, and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with the Son Jesus Christ. We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.

This is the message we have heard from Jesus Christ and proclaim to you, that God is light and in God there is no darkness at all. If we say that we have fellowship with God while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; but if we walk in the light as God is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, God's Son, cleanses us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, God


who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make God a liar, and God's word is not in us.

My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous, and who is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world.

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors were locked where the disciples were, for fear of the temple authorities, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may continue to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

A: Your creation cries out, O God, and you listen. Nurture trees, crops, wildflowers, and all growing things. Guide farmers, gardeners, arborists, and others who tend the soil and nurture plants into life. Guide us as consumers

of agricultural products in supporting ethical and sustainable enterprises to the extent we can. God of grace,

C: hear our prayer.

A: Your world cries out, O God, and you listen. Guide police, firefighters, paramedics, and other first responders to work for the well-being of communities and the dignity of every person, that no one may need to live in fear. We especially pray for those who work in hunger relief and disaster relief around the world. Continue to give discernment to the many humanitarian aid workers who find themselves in risky places and forced to make unthinkable decisions about how and when and where to distribute aid. God of grace,

C: hear our prayer.

A: Your children cry out, O God, and you listen. Hear your people crying out for justice, for an end to racism, excessive policing, ableism, sexism, classism, and heterosexism, and for a world where all are fed and safe. We especially pray for all those who find themselves incarcerated, especially at the

Putnamville Correctional Facility, the Indiana Women's Prison, the Edinburgh Correctional Facility, and the many other carceral spaces in Indiana. Replenish the wells of compassion and gentleness for those who staff these spaces. Renew the patience and hope of those who find themselves incarcerated. Be near to those charged with supporting formerlyincarcerated people making their way back into ordinary life. Guide all of us in becoming the community we need to be to support people in need. We also pray for all who cry out in suffering or pain especially, Elif, Paula, Doug, Yvonne, Barbara, Steve, Brenda, Jim, Ted, Bob, Kent, Mark, Bill, Don and Marilyn, and Harry. God of grace,

C: hear our prayer.

A: Your congregations cry out, O God, and you listen. Renew pastors, deacons, musicians, and other staff, administrators, and volunteers who facilitated Holy Week and Easter worship. Give them rest—real, restorative rest—in the Easter season. Guide the hearts and minds of those serving on church leadership boards as they fill clerical,

staff and volunteer positions in churches across our synod. Open each of our hearts to discern where God calls each of us to serve. God of grace,

C: hear our prayer.

A: Accept our gratitude, O God, for the lives of those who now rest in you especially Dietrich Bonhoeffer and all whose lives have been given in faithfulness to the gospel. Grant us your peace amid our fears. Grant comfort and strength to Kent Unger and his family as they mourn the death of his sister, Marsha. God of grace,

C: hear our prayer.

A: Into your hands, most merciful God, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in your abiding love; through Jesus Christ, our resurrected and living Lord.


Word in the Woods
