### From the Senior Pastor

Every year, just being New Year's Day, Anne Lamott shares an anti-diet piece she wrote several years ago. It begins with a conversation with her therapist, whom Anne has just told she intends to start a diet. Her therapist responds, "Oh, that's great honey. How much weight are you hoping to gain?" Now, I'm not writing a piece about diets, but about resolutions, in general. So often, we set resolutions that are unkeepable, filled with self-judgement that, when we fail, only lead to more judgement. I am, generally, a resolution skeptic, but, more and more, I think I am grateful for the potential resolution-setting-season provides for self-reflection.

Admittedly, many of us (me, I'm definitely talking about myself!) set resolutions based on societal and cultural expectations for how we look and act. This is becoming a riskier endeavor, given what we know about the algorithms that surround us every day. Searching health information sends us down rabbit holes of increasingly dubious science. As evidence, teen girls new to social media will be exposed to pro-eating-disordered content within days of adopting a new platform.

Yet, setting a resolution can begin with self-reflection, with a deeper-than-normal look at our actions and how they affect ourselves and others. One tool that might be helpful in this regard is Ignatian Examen. At its heart, the

### What the Senior Pastor is Reading

*Yarn Harlot: The Secret Life of a Knitter* by [Stephanie Pearl-McPhee](#)

Hear me out. I didn't title the book, and, yes, it is a *knitting book*, of all things. This book, though, probably ranks extremely high on books I talk about to others. It taught me to "sit and have a think" about tricky problems. And that something as complicated as an Aran knit sweater (one of those beautiful sweaters from Ireland) is really, truly just a series of two stitches—how many other things in life are similarly reducible? And then, there is this line, "You never leave the brokenhearted." It is a light read, but, given all the heartbreak in the world, don't we sometimes need an invitation to appreciate our own lives?

Examen allows for regular reflection of our days, what we do, say, think—and how these things draw us closer to or further from God and one another. Examen begins and ends with God: praying for God's presence and placing the day to come into God's hands.

To be honest, I am often tempted to reduce Examen to "how can I be a better person?" This question turns me back to those cultural and societal expectations; it turns me toward what others think of me and away from God's love for me. When I attend more carefully to the beginning and end of the practice—to God's presence with me, past, present, and future—I am much more likely to find the resolve necessary to be a better neighbor, a better friend, a better parent, spouse, and pastor—or, at least, more present to my own life.

Perhaps, if you are inclined to set a resolution, it might be helpful to reflect that January 1, the kick-off of resolution season, is set squarely in the season of Christmas. Ask yourself, will this resolution reflect God-with-us more clearly in my life? Will it reveal more clearly God's presence in my life? Will it help me dwell better with my neighbors, in the spirit of the God who dwells with us?

Beloved, surely God is transforming the world and transforming you and me to be more Christ-like. But, please, do not lose sight of the fact that God's comes among our lives *as they are*, and not in the social-media-hazed perfection we imagine they might be. Whoever you might dream yourself to be in 2026, remember you are a Beloved Child of God always.

## New Space to Play in 2026

For many years, our congregation has been committed to welcoming children and their families. We provide spaces for young children to play in the nursery and, during worship, in the Prayer Pond. We provide worship aids including worship bags, fidgets, and children's bulletins. Caring adults provide thoughtful Sunday School and Vacation Bible School lessons; children are taught to sing, and their worship leadership is applauded. Celebrating this tradition, we are excited to announce a new addition to our outdoor space - a natural play space for children and families!

This new outdoor play space will give space to support the growth, joy, and fellowship of our youngest members. It will be an outward signal to our community that we live, share, and celebrate God's grace with children.

In keeping with our values, this play space will be created using natural and recycled materials. It will give children space to explore and enjoy the natural world. By putting the space to the west of the community garden, children will be protected from the road without having to create a barrier to play. It will be a safe, welcoming space for children to play, laugh, and build friendships.

Through designated memorial gifts, we are able to move forward with the design and implementation of this project in the coming months. We've sought input from families with children and reputable playground designers. We will share the proposed design with our members and friends in mid-winter. Once the playground is complete, we look forward to celebrating together with a special dedication and play day.



## In These Times: Stewardship Pledge Campaign

For 2026, our budget assumes approximately \$490,000 in expenses, based on our need and congregational giving patterns. To date, 70 households have pledged over \$312,000 toward our goal. Thank you!

St. Thomas parishioners brought Christmas joy to 20 children in 5 families in [Pantry 279's Christmas gift program](#).


36 St. Thomas households bought gifts for children aged 3 - 17 who each had 5 presents from us under their tree on Christmas

morning. A half dozen intrepid wrappers festooned the presents with paper and bows. Overall, the Pantry matched 1603 children (568 families) with volunteer Santas and held an extra toy day for families who didn't get signed up in time to "shop" for their children. The Mission Committee thanks everyone in the congregation who took part in helping to meet the significant need in our community this Christmas.



## Creation Care Calling

While enjoying our early winter snow and cold weather, you may not have noticed the church building is more comfortable with attic insulation recently added above the office and east wing of the building. We now have reduced heat loss through the ceiling. Also the high efficiency cold weather heat pump operating at a low speed to maintain constant temperature is warming the east hallway and bathrooms.

Likewise with the natural ocean gulf stream heat pump transferring heat from the equator to the Arctic, the climate of western Europe



will become colder as the melting Greenland ice sheet disrupts the Atlantic circulation of warm water from the equator north to the Arctic with cold water returning in a loop back to the equator.

If you want to learn more about the benefits of heat pump clothes dryers, water heaters, and cold climate heating, the city has the [Bloomington Energy Works](#) program which offers free energy audits and provides educational opportunities on the benefits of energy efficiency and clean energy projects.
