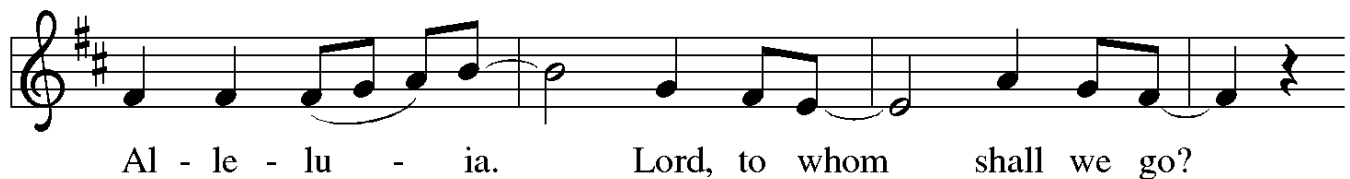
ourselves heard this voice come from heaven,
